Always follow safe removal procedures, including powering down equipment, carefully disengaging connectors, and capping exposed ends to prevent contamination or injury .
6. Verify Claims and Damages If a party claims lost revenue due to cable removal or downtime, verify the actual capacity and service impact. Use proper testing tools, such as OTDR (Optical Time-Domain Reflectometer), to assess the extent of damage and required repairs
